



The Queen's House

This beautiful 17th-century classical villa, refurbished and reopened a few months ago, with breath-taking views across London's oldest royal park and up to the Royal Observatory, is an unforgettable setting for weddings, lunches and receptions.



Introduction

The Queen's House, jewel in the Greenwich crown, is one of the earliest examples of classical architecture in England and one of Inigo Jones' few surviving major works.

The former Royal palace, known also as the House of Delight, was designed around 400 years ago as a setting for Queen Anne of Denmark's lavish parties.

The Queen's House is now home to a collection of great artworks, including paintings by William Hodges, George Stubbs, William Hogarth, Thomas Gainsborough and Dutch maritime artist the Van de Veldes.

The iconic portrait of the Armada Portrait of Elizabeth I is now on permanent display for the first time in its 425-year history in the reopened Queen's House, on the site of the original Greenwich Palace, which was the birthplace of Elizabeth I herself.

The Queen's house is an elegant venue, steeped in history and romance, offering a picture-perfect setting for wedding and corporate dinners/receptions.

The Great Hall

The Great Hall is at the heart of the Queen’s House, reflecting Renaissance ideals of mathematical, classical proportion and harmony.

It features the striking geometrically-patterned black-and-white marble floor dating all the way back to 1635. The room is a perfect 40-foot cube with fine views of the River Thames and the Old Royal Naval College.

The Great Hall is a popular location for weddings, buffet suppers, cocktail receptions and corporate dinners.

Orangery and South Parlours

The South Parlours and Orangery located at the back of the Queen's House provide the main working spaces, ideal for daytime meetings.

The Tulip Stairs

The iconic stairs, one of the original features of the Queen's House, are a perfect backdrop for wedding photography.

The elegant Tulip Stairs are the first geometric self-supporting spiral staircase in the UK. Although called the 'tulip' stairs, it is thought that the flowers in the wrought-iron balustrade are actually fleurs-de-lis, as this was the emblem of the Bourbon family of which Queen Henrietta Maria was a member.

It is also the location of the Rev R. W. Hardy's famous 'ghost' photograph taken in 1966, which appears to show two or three shrouded figures on the staircase – a phenomenon that has never been explained logically to this day.
